What about the Politics of Deconstruction?

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The essay has two focuses: Europe and community. In his study *Europe or the Infinite Task* Rodolphe Gasché claims that a vigorous analysis of the concept of Europe may contribute to a better understanding of Europe's present political crisis. On the other hand, the work of Maurice Blanchot, Giorgio Agamben and especially Jean-Luc Nancy and Roberto Esposito, encourages us to think about community beyond the framework of identity politics. Which questions does this raise in respect to Gasché's "deconstructive" project? What do these projects, Nancy's and Esposito's on one side and Gasché's on the other, have in common?

A philosophical discourse that would not be provoked or interrupted by the violence of an appeal from the other, from an experience that cannot be dominated, would not be a very questioning, very interesting philosophical discourse.¹

Referring to this observation made by Derrida in an interview² from 1990, Rodolphe Gasché in his book *The Honor of Thinking* claims that philosophical thought as a thought that is destined or addressed to someone "presupposes the experience of a wound – a wound that is not necessarily caused by some event that should have happened only once, and to which the figure of the philosopher should have
